# **HOW TO PLAY: OPTION 1 (K-1st grade)**

#### Goal:

Students internalize various mentchlichkeit values, leading to a healthier, emotionally balanced classroom.

#### **Objective:**

- \* Collect the most cards by the end of the game.
- \* Deal 7 cards each for 2-3 players, and deal 5 cards for 3+ players.
- \* Stack the rest of the cards face down in the "Fish Pond."
- \* Players ask each other for matching cards until the cards are gone.
- \* Player with the most pairs wins.

### **ADVANCED PLAY: Option 2**

- Explain an example for each picture
- **Sort cards into categories** of Mentch characteristics using the values board on Card 3.





# **ADDITIONAL GAMES AND STRATEGIES:**



- » Play Charades- pick a card and act out the scenario.
- » Create Mentch Art- Use an artistic medium to create a 'Kindness Quilt' or Banner or Mural.
- » Improv Games that help teach collaboration, being in the moment awareness and creativity -
  - » Ball Game One person has a ball and says a middah and tosses it to someone who has to give an example the students must pay attention to know how to respond if the ball gets tossed to them. This helps with active listening and attention skills.
  - Themed Story Chain Someone starts a story by using one of the cards as the beginning of the story and the next person adds to the story making it a story told by the whole group.
- » Bibliodrama Activity A teacher reads through selected text stopping at points of interest to ask children to step into the role of a character and voice what the character is experiencing or feeling.
